






The middle cupboard in the teen library has been transformed into a new display shelf that will hold a featured genre each month. Thanks to Mel Graybill for making this possible!


Ryan & Angie Regier

Vonnie's Views

Over the last 150 days, I've been reading one psalm each day alongside my regular Bible reading. Today, I finished. As I reached the end, I found myself lingering over Psalms 146-150. These last five Psalms feel like a breathtaking grand finale of a fireworks show—only these are a grand finale of worship. Each of these psalms begins and ends with the same phrase: "Praise the Lord."

In Hebrew, this phrase is **halal Yah**. *Halal* means "to shine, to boast, to celebrate," and *Yah* is a shortened form of God's sacred name. Put them together and you get a word we all know: **Hallelujah!** Hallelujah isn't just a word, it's an invitation. It's a call to worship, to celebrate who God is and what He has done. That's why the ESV (the translation I use) renders it: "**Praise the Lord!**"

As I spent time with each of these psalms over the last five days, I kept asking: Why does the book of Psalms end this way? What are these final five chapters trying to tell us? Let's take a look together:

Psalm 146 – **The God You Can Trust.** This psalm reminds us not to put our trust in princes or earthly powers. They are mortal and created. God, however, is eternal and the creator. He:

- Frees the prisoners
- Opens blind eyes
- Executes justice
- Lifts up the bowed down

He's the God who rescues us and who sustains us. That's a God worthy of praise.

Psalm 147 – **The God Who Heals the Brokenhearted.** God not only governs the universe, He cares deeply for His people. Psalm 147 shows us a tender God who: "Heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds" (v. 3). How powerful is this God? Look up at the night sky. He not only made the stars but has named every one of them! And still, "The Lord takes pleasure in those who fear him, in those who hope in his steadfast love" (v. 11). This is a God who loves us and longs for us to draw near to through worship.

Psalm 148 – **The Creator God.** Psalm 148 takes us on a journey through creation—sun, moon, sea creatures, mountains, animals, and people—calling all to worship the Lord. This psalm mirrors the creation story in Genesis and reminds us that everything created was made to glorify God. In other words, praise isn't just for people; it's the purpose of all creation.

Psalm 149 – The God Who Invites Worship. This psalm reflects on Israel's experience of worship in the temple, the music, the dancing, the joy. It reminds us of God's covenant with His people and how He designed their worship experience. There's a sense of both celebration and remembrance here: "Let the children of Zion rejoice in their King!" (v. 2) We, too, are invited to rejoice and remember what God has done for us and in us.

Psalm 150 – **The God Worthy of Praise.** This Psalm is pure, unfiltered worship. There are no requests, no laments, just praise: "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord. Praise the Lord!" (v. 6) Psalm 150 brings the journey through Psalms to a climactic end. After all the struggles, questions, victories, and promises of the previous 149 chapters, the final word is clear: **God is worthy. Praise Him.**

So, why end with praise? After walking through the laments, the doubts, the joys, the deliverance, and the promises, the final word is **praise**. Intentional praise. Whole-hearted praise. Praise is both the response to God and the goal of a life walking with God. In good times and hard times, praise reorients our hearts toward the One who is faithful, powerful, and good.

No matter what season of life you find yourself in, may these last five psalms remind you: there is always a reason to say Hallelujah! "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord. Praise the Lord!" Psalm 150:6

Greetings from Elkhart, Indiana. The picture is of me training Daniel, a young man who wants to learn electonics and radio. This is another exciting opportunity. Daniel comes to SonSet Solutions after work two times per week to learn and to help. He is already helping greatly with making parts for the TB1000 shortwave transmitter. The current transmitter in production is destined for Cusco, Peru. We will probably ship it next week.

These transmitters are a great tool we offer to our partners in ministry. They reach farther than an FM transmitter does. They cover 300 miles in all directions. These transmitters work with the SonSet® radios because the radios receive shortwave along with AM and FM.

Some of my time with Daniel is spent answering his questions. For example, "How does a transistor work?" I have drawn up simple circuits to build and modify, allowing him to learn how the various pieces work together. We love to encourage young people to use their skills and interests in the Lord's work. Please pray for Daniel to sense God's leading for his future.
