
The Fellowship Hall was filled with sounds of Carols and the smell of cookies on December 7th for our Annual Carols & Cookies.

Vonnies Views

A couple of decades ago, I found myself discouraged by how my life was “turning out.” Doubt and anxiety felt like constant companions. One afternoon, I met a friend for lunch in McPherson and poured out all my frustrations—especially my feeling that God hadn’t given me the “desires of my heart,” even though I had tried to be faithful.

After listening patiently, she quietly said, “You don’t know your God, do you?” Her words stung, and instantly made me angry. But at the same time they also rang true. Without realizing it, I had slipped into believing that if I did “A,” then God owed me “B.” It was a transactional view of faith; one that left no room for mystery, suffering, or the deeper purposes of God.

That conversation sent me back to Scripture with new eyes. I wanted to know who God *really* is—rather than who I assumed Him to be. I read the entire Bible slowly, more than once. I read theology, Puritan writings and authors such as RC Sproul, JI Packer, Jerry Bridges and AW Tozier. Over the next decade, I discovered a God far bigger, wiser, and more beautiful than the version of God I had created in my mind.

I learned to know a God who...

...created a beautiful and good world that displays His glory.

...calls to all people everywhere to acknowledge His existence, seek Him, and intimately know Him.

... loved us so much that He sent His Son, Jesus Christ to bear the full weight of sin so He could restore a relationship with us.

... grieves over sin but never abandons His people, continuing to pursue their hearts.

... shows mercy, justice, patience, and steadfast love.

I discovered a God who is so faithful that he does the very best for me—most generally by shaping for me a life *does not* follow my shallow plan. This God cannot be reduced to a formula and certainly cannot be manipulated. But this God is absolutely trustworthy and good, *always good*. He does not give up on us, no matter how often or how far we stray from Him. And He can be trusted—deeply, fully, wholeheartedly.

This Christmas season, I invite you to reflect on the mystery of the Incarnation—God choosing to come near to us; to save us. Whatever disappointments, sorrows, or unmet dreams you carry, bring them to the God who specializes in redemption and restoration. He is better than we imagine—and nearer than we think.

I will praise you, Lord, with all my heart; I will tell of all the marvelous things you have done.

I will be filled with joy because of you.

I will sing praises to your name, O Most High.

But the Lord reigns forever, executing judgment from his throne.

He will judge the world with justice and rule the nations with fairness.

The Lord is a shelter for the oppressed, a refuge in times of trouble.

Those who know your name trust in you, for you, O Lord, do not abandon those who search for you.

Dear Friends,

As I sit here thinking of what to share with you this year, I can't help but think of a song that we enjoy singing with the kids that come to after school Kids' Bible Club. The song goes: "JESUS and OTHERS and YOU, what a wonderful way to spell JOY. JESUS and OTHERS and YOU in the life of each girl and each boy. "J" is for Jesus, for He has first place, "O" is for others you meet face to face. "Y" is for you in whatever you do, put yourself third and spell JOY."

We thank the Lord for the many opportunities that He gives us to share about Jesus. Our little country church has kept the doors open, except for a couple of Sundays when the roads were not plowed or were so icy that we didn't have church. We average between 12 and 15 on a Sunday morning. Every other month we host a Community Hymn Sing on Sunday evening and what a wonderful time of fellowship we have after the singing.

We had our Vacation Bible School the last week of June with an average of 24 children, and we had a good number of adults to help. Our theme for this year was "Little Is Much when God Is in It." What a JOY to be able to share about Jesus.

God has given us many opportunities to reach out to others as well. A JOY in our lives is the two Kids' Bible Clubs that we have each week. Again, the number isn't large, but He has sent us 7 special young people, three of which are new this year. Five of them are faithful in coming both days and two more usually join on Tuesday. It is exciting to see how even the youngest, second graders, can find the right verse when I tell them to turn to a certain scripture. Each one wants to take a turn to read the verse. We pray that as these children go home, that they take with them what we have talked or sung about in class because only one of them comes from a solid home situation. You can pray for us as we have this contact.

Another group that we get to reach out to is on the other end of the spectrum: residents in a care center and/or a retirement center. Each Monday evening, we go to the care center in town to have a Bible study with the residents. We have been blessed this year with a good attendance, usually 15 or more. They enjoy singing with us for about 15 minutes before Edwin does a Bible lesson. Every other month we go there for the Sunday afternoon chapel service. Each month that there are five Sundays, we go into a town about 15 miles away to a retirement center and do their chapel service. We were asked to come a Sunday evening in November to do a

“Community Hymn Sing.” This is the first time they have had one, so the attendance wasn’t large, but we’ve been asked by a few residents when we are coming back to do it again.

Put yourself third: we have had a full year. The year started off on a sad note. Eloise lost her youngest sister, but it was good to be with family members and friends that we haven’t seen for a long time. Eloise’s family tries to get together each August for a couple of days in Sioux Falls, SD. Those that get together are usually her siblings and maybe a niece or nephew or two; this year there were even some “greats” there. We also got to see Edwin’s sister, Connie, as she came back from Oregon for the memorial service of a cousin. We took our two major trips again this year. In April we went to the Rural Home Mission’s Rural and Small-Town Church conference in Morton, IL. Then in July we attended our church’s annual conference, this year close to Lancaster, PA. That was a very special time, getting to meet up with those we see each year at conference. But this year we were able to visit several retired missionary couples whom we knew in Taiwan and who have now retired to the Lancaster area. Yes, we did some sightseeing along the way stopping at Gettysburg and also stopping to see the site where the plane, Flight 93, went down in PA on 9/11.

As we continue to age there is often a subject that comes up – health. It was with great JOY for us as Eloise got an all-clear report from her oncologist, saying she could stop taking her medicine and that she doesn’t need to return for further appointments. We both had a pre-cancer spot or two removed.

We trust that you have had a year filled with JOY as well. As we look forward to 2026, we don’t know what is ahead, but what JOY there would be if the Lord would return to take us home to be with Him. We look forward to hearing from you in the next weeks/months.

MERRY CHRISTMAS 2025!

What a wonderful holiday, especially for those of us who know the REASON FOR THE SEASON IS JESUS CHRIST. Dear Garden Community Church


