The first quarter of 2024, I rapidly read through the Bible. After completing that, I decided to read my favorite books in a slower more deliberate way: Paul's letters, the book of Genesis, and the prophets. Currently I'm reading the Isiaah—an eloquent prophet who explored the nature of God, human sin, and divine redemption. Isaiah's prophecies reveal God's holiness, His "otherness," the divine response to sin, and the promise of Messiah.

In a time of political upheaval, Isaiah experienced a profound encounter with the holiness of God. Isaiah had a vision in which he found himself in the very throne room of God! There he saw the Lord sitting on a majestic throne, surrounded by seraphim, who proclaimed "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of Hosts" (6:3). Overwhelmed, Isaiah was undone as absolute holiness exposed his sinfulness. Lips cleansed with a burning coal, Isaiah's guilt was removed, he received God's commission and empowerment to proclaim God's message to a sin-darkened society.

Isaiah repeatedly emphasized the uniqueness and supremacy of God. God is not on a "gradient" or a "scale" with any created thing (including humans, seraphim, or angels). He is entirely distinct from all creation and unparalleled in majesty. "I make known the end from the beginning, from ancient times, what is still to come. I say, 'My purpose will stand, and I will do all that I please." (Isaiah 46:10 NIV) Unlike non-living idols, the Lord is described as the Living God who knows His people intimately and calls them by name (43:5). Throughout Isaiah, the call to recognize God's uniqueness served as both a warning against idolatry and an invitation to trust God's unfailing love and salvation.

In stark contrast to the holiness of God, Isaiah detailed the horrendous sin patterns that characterized God's chosen people. The "woes" of Isaiah 5 specified the depths to which God's people had fallen: aggressive greed (vs 8-10), sinful excess (vs 11-12), self-

deception and mocking of God (vs 18-19), redefining truth (vs 20), arrogant false wisdom (vs 21), and a drunken, corrupt justice system (vs 22-23). These sins were present in a people who maintained a rigorous religious façade, which made God recoil (Isaiah 1:11-15). God's judgment against his people's covenant unfaithfulness was stark; yet tempered with hope. God didn't hold back from displaying how hurt he was by Israel's unfaithfulness and how much he desired restoration rather than judgement.

The promised Messiah was revealed in Isaiah with absolute clarity. "See, my servant will act wisely, He will be raised and lifted up and highly exalted. Just as there were many who were appalled at him—his appearance was so disfigured beyond that of any human being and his form marred beyond human likeness—so he will sprinkle many nations, and kings will shut their mouths because of him. For what they were not told, they will see, and what they have not heard, they will understand." (Isaiah 52:13-15 NIV). Prophecies like those found in Isaiah 9 and 53 spoke of a child born to us who would carry the weight of human sin and bring about redemption. This Messiah would be humble and gentle (40:1; 66:13), bear the weight of human sin and suffering (52:13-15; 53:4-6), and fulfil the divine promise of restoration (9:2, 11:1-10; 61:1-3).

Through its exploration of these themes, the book of Isaiah invites us, as we read this book, to recognize both the seriousness of sin and the incredible grace of God. The Gospels clearly confirm that Jesus Christ fulfilled Isaiah's prophecies (Luke 4:14-21). As the Messiah, Jesus taught that everyone falls short of God's standards (Mark 10:18). Yet, in grace, He extends forgiveness to all those who believe in Him (John 3:16). By believing this good news through repentance of sin and putting one's faith in Jesus for salvation, sinners exchange the judgment Isaiah pronounced and instead receive all the promised blessings (Mark 1:15).

Remember the former things, those of long ago; I am God, and there is no other; I am God, and there is none like me.

Isaiah 46:9

STRAIGHT FROM THE HEART

I read Proverbs 18:9 in my daily devotions recently: "One who is slack in work is close kin to a vandal." NRSV version. I thought about the verse for a few minutes. I was curious as to the exact definition of a "vandal" because that person is equated with a slacker. I learned that a "vandal" is involved in deliberate destruction of or damage to public or private property. To put it in practical terms, a person who is slack in their work, and is able-bodied is in the process of vandalizing/destroying their life.

The majority of the people who come into the New Hope Shelter come in without a job. They have little or no money, and are at a low point in their life. Our response to able-bodied people is sympathy and direction. We try to understand the barriers they are facing to employment and to work with them to overcome those barriers to get a job that will sustain them.

Occasionally we run into those who are slackers, who are committed to vandalizing their lives. We try to encourage, give direction, and encourage some more. After a reasonable time, if that effort does not work, we set a deadline for the person to find a job. If a job is not found by the deadline, that person is asked to leave.

To protect the innocent, I will tell you the story of a woman we could not motivate at another shelter where we served. We went through the process described above for a series of weeks to no avail. She kept promising that the 'interview on next Monday is going to produce a job for me." It never happened. A deadline was set. It came and went. Still there was no job.

I remember the Monday when I went to her room and told her she needed to move. The air was filled with curses and invective. "How could we....." "How dare we....." She packed up her car and left. We did not hear from her again for more than six months.

One afternoon, my wife, Marilyn was in the parking lot of the local Walmart. She heard someone shouting her name. She looked up and this woman was coming in her direction. Marilyn told me later that she did not know what to expect.

The woman told Marilyn, "Thanks for everything you did for me. By kicking me out, you kicked me in the behind. I needed it so bad. I went out and got a job. I have you to thank for my job, car, and apartment. Now I have the money to support myself. Thanks."

At the New Hope Shelter, we are committed to accountability and to restoring hope to people's lives and helping them become productive citizens once again.



Dear Friends,



We are hoping that will take care of the problem. He has been such a help with Ev. He likes to cook, so that has been wonderful. He also willingly does dishes, vacuums the floors, and even helps with laundry. Though our lives may be restricted to our house, in this season, we love to serve you and others through our prayers! What an honor and privilege it is to



stand with you before the throne of God! We are so thankful for all of you and the continued, generous support you have shown to us!
